BUDGET MAINTAINS ALL CURRENT PROGRAMS, STAYS WITHIN TAX CAP

Through prudent fiscal planning, we are delighted to present to our residents a 2016-17 budget that carries a 0.95 percent projected tax levy increase, which is within the district's tax cap. The proposed budget-to-budget increase is \$307,304, or 0.29 percent. Even with this minimal increase and fiscal challenges, we maintain all current programs and staff.

The district's overall decrease in state aid reflects a decrease in building aid as a result of older capital projects no longer generating building aid. However, we are grateful for the **FULL** restoration of the Gap Elimination Adjustment totaling \$969,506. This, along with a number of teacher retirements districtwide, has allowed us to maintain a cap-compliant budget that invests in the future of our students and to keep our reserves at an acceptable level.

In addition to preserving all of the programs that have led our students to flourish, we will remain focused on technology and 21st-century learning. The proposed budget also includes a number of capital improvements to our facilities, as well as the purchase of two large buses, two wheelchair vans and two rear axle vans.

The Board and administration have worked diligently to explore all possible efficiencies and ways to support both our students and our taxpayers. The budget that will be on the ballot meets our expectations and goals. All previous presentations and communications regarding the budget are available on the district's website, www.deerparkschools.org.

We thank you for your interest and participation in our district, and for joining us in strongly valuing education. Please remember to vote on Tuesday, May 17. Polls will be open from 7 a.m.-9 p.m. at Deer Park High School in the gymnasium.




ACADEMICS

An annual budget contains estimates of revenues and expenditures, and the actual financial results will differ from the budget. As noted by the Office of the State Comptroller, "A certain amount of the budget should be set aside for contingencies (either with a line item, or through the use of fund balances or reserves), to allow for the smooth operation of government in case of emergencies or minor errors in calculating revenues or expenditures." In the event that any surplus funds are available at the end of the fiscal year, the Board of Education will determine the best use of these funds, which may include using these funds to reduce taxes, maintain programs, fund the unappropriated undesignated reserve as allowed by law at a maximum of 4 percent of the subsequent year's budget and/or fund other reserves.



FAQs

Q: What are a school district budget's main components?

A: There are two accounting segments that comprise the district budget — expenditures and revenues. Expenditures are calculated for instruction, central services, transportation and other categories listed in the "Expenditures" chart. The district derives revenue to fund



expenditures from the tax levy, state aid, payments in lieu of taxes (PILOTs) from Suffolk County for businesses operating in Deer Park, interest on account balances, BOCES reimbursements and related services as seen on the "Estimated Revenues" chart. The budget must be structured to balance expenditures with anticipated revenues.

Q: What is the difference between the tax levy and the tax rate?

A: The tax levy is the amount of money the Board of Education requests from the Town of Babylon in order to balance the budget after state aid and other revenues are taken into consideration. The tax rate is not set by the Board of Education. The town assessor calculates the assessed valuation of the properties in the Town of Babylon from which the tax rate is calculated. It is important to note that the tax levy limit applies only to the school district's tax levy, not the tax rate or an individual tax bill.

Q: What is a contingency budget?

A: Should voters defeat the proposed budget on May 17, the budget may be presented for one more vote prior to July. If the Board opts not to have a second vote, it can immediately adopt a contingency budget, which would force the district to operate with a zero percent tax levy increase under the state's tax cap law. If a second proposed budget is defeated, the district must, by law, adopt at zero percent.

VOTER INFORMATION

Voter Eligibility and Registration:

Deer Park residents are urged to vote in all school district elections. To cast your ballot in the May 17 budget vote and Board trustee election, you must be:

- A citizen of the United States.
- 18 years of age or older (we encourage eligible students to exercise their right to vote).
- A resident of the Deer Park School District for 30 days prior to vote.
- Registered to vote with the Suffolk County Board of Elections, or registered with the school district.

Registration is required if you have not voted within four years in a general election or school election. Registration will be held on:

- Thursday, May 5, Deer Park High School, 4-8 p.m.
- Monday, May 9, Administration Building, 9 a.m.-2 p.m.
- Tuesday, May 10, Administration Building, 9 a.m.-2 p.m.
