## TAX LEVY

Tax Levy Increase \$ 1,301,146

## OTHER REVENUE/FUNDING SOURCES

- State Aid per Governor's proposal
  - \$47,982,197
- Other Revenue
  - \$10,536,537
    - Includes interest earnings, PILOTs, employee health insurance contributions, building rentals, and other miscellaneous revenue sources.
- Reserves
  - \$800,000 from Reserve for Tax Reduction
- Appropriated Fund Balance
  - \$1,225,000

## EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

- ERS and TRS (\$2,095,992 and \$6,001,095 respectively)
  - Employer contribution rate increased for ERS and decreased for TRS
- Social Security (\$5,774,023)
  - Change in FICA wage limit: \$160,200
- Workers Compensation (\$750,000)
  - 21-22 claims paid \$866,639; 22-23 claims paid to date \$510,733
- Life Insurance, Disability, Dental and Optical Insurance
  - Budget covers slight premium increases
- Health Insurance
  - Estimated 15% premium increase based on previous years
  - Includes the health insurance buyback per CBAs

## EMPLOYEE BENEFITS (CONTINUED)

- Medicare Retirees (\$1,328,046)
  - Reimbursement for Medicare premiums for retirees
  - Medicare premiums \$164.90 per month
- Compensated Absences (\$400,000)
  - Anticipate increase in retirees in 2023-2024
- Unemployment Insurance (\$100,000)
  - Covers quarterly unemployment insurance claims

## DEBT SERVICE AND INTERFUND TRANSFERS

#### Summer Handicapped (\$250,000)

- For our ESY program
- Our share of expenditures is 20% and the State picks up 80%

#### Transfer to Capital Funds (\$1,200,000)

- Increase for priority projects
- \$800,000 from Reserve for Tax Reduction assists with offsetting this transfer
- Proposed projects
  - HS Auditorium Dimming Rack
  - HS Cooling Tower Replacement
  - HS Roof (partial) areas TBD
  - HS Curbing
  - District Wide Bathroom Upgrades
  - Transportation Diesel Tank Replacement
  - Transportation Gas Monitoring System
  - Districtwide Asbestos Abatement

#### Debt Service

- Continuation of bond, EPC and bus lease payments
- New EPC (Phase II) financing
- TAN Interest increased due to increasing rates

## BOARD OF EDUCATION AND CENTRAL ADMINISTRATION

#### Board of Education

- Most expenditures remain flat from prior year
- Slight increase in conferences
- Increase in cost of registrars and tellers for the annual budget vote

#### Central Administration

- Contractual salary increases
- Increase in equipment and supplies
  - New furniture and equipment for Superintendent's office

## FINANCE AND LEGAL SERVICES

#### Finance

- Contractual salary increases
- Repairs/Contracts (\$260,000)
  - Districtwide copier lease and usage
  - Continuing records retention project
    - HS records
- Most other expenditures remain flat from prior year
- Supplies new chairs for Asst. Supt. Office
- BOCES Codes
  - General 3% increase according to BOCES
  - E-rate, Health and Safety, State Aid support

#### Legal Services

- Contractual increase in school attorney fee (\$72,229)
- Other Legal Services (\$90,000)
  - Current Spending through November billing \$62,239
  - Also includes outside counsel fees for other claims

## PERSONNEL ADMINISTRATION AND UNCLASSIFIED EXPENDITURES

#### Personnel

- Contractual salary increases
- Professional and Technical Services (\$8,000)
  - Fingerprinting and background checks
  - Employee Assistance Program
- Most other expenditures remain flat from prior year
- BOCES Codes
  - General 3% increase according to BOCES
  - Teacher Certification, workshops, OLAS, AESOP

#### Public Relations

Syntax (\$73,744) (BOCES)

#### BOCES East Admin Data Processing (\$487,348)

- Finance Manager
- Infinite Campus including online registration

#### Unclassified

- General Liability Insurance (\$640,438)
  - Negotiated a decrease in the premium beginning January 1, 2023
  - Researching and working with NYSIR/IT in increase cyber insurance
- Student Accident Insurance (\$85,000)
- BOCES Admin/Capital (\$223,683/\$161,852)

## CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT AND SUPERVISION

#### Curriculum Development and Supervision

- Contractual salary increases
- Conferences (\$25,000)
  - Used at the discretion of the Superintendent
- Assembly Programs
  - No increase
  - Anti-bullying, character building
- Admin Supplies all buildings (\$31,000)
  - Desk/chair replacements
  - Used at each principal's discretion
- Administrative Conferences (\$8,000)
  - Per contract

## INSTRUCTION

#### Teaching – Regular Day School

- Contractual salary increases (Total salaries: \$30,698,116)
  - Includes FTE increases in ENL and Special Education
    - See FTE chart
  - Also includes contingent positions in each building
  - See Enrollment Data and Elementary Class Size Chart
- Teaching Assistants (\$365,424)
  - For non-special education needs (not IEP driven)
- AIS (\$838,779)
  - Includes set aside of \$773,779 per Governor's budget proposal
    - More detail to follow once state budget is finalized
- Foster Tuition (\$190,000)
  - Out of district placement for foster students originally from Deer Park
- Conferences (\$13,000)
  - Per DPTA contract
- BOCES Codes
  - General 3% increase
  - BOCES East Arts in Schools increased to provide more programs in the schools
    - Leveraging BOCES aid
- Supplies
  - Increases for all schools for general classroom supplies
  - Includes a full set of folding chairs for HS graduation no more rentals

## INSTRUCTION - CONT'D

#### Departmental Codes

- Most codes showing reallocation due to departmental needs
- Highlights
  - World Language
    - Textbooks (\$10,000)
      - Online textbooks to support new curricula and changing standards for World Languages
  - Technology Equipment (\$18,512)
    - Various equipment purchases for wood shops at Robert Frost
      - Sanders, drill presses
  - Technology Supplies (\$56,755)
    - Various supplies and furniture purchases for HS and RF
      - Includes Lego tables, cordless tool kits, band saws, sanders, charging stations
  - Music Equipment (\$17,000)
    - New risers for HS
  - Science Supplies
    - Includes microscope cameras, balances for HS and RF

### INSTRUCTIONAL MEDIA

#### Library

- Salary contractual increases
- Equipment HS (\$20,000)
  - Purchase and installation of new circulation desk
- HS Library remodel estimated costs included in building repairs (next meeting)
- BOCES Library
  - School library automation
  - Online resources and databases for each school

#### Audio Visual

- Supplies (\$14,199)
  - Various supplies including batteries, laminating materials, office supplies, microphones

## INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY

#### Equipment – (\$375,000)

- Hallway and cafeteria video monitors for HS and RF
- Includes contingency funds for emergencies

#### Repairs and Contracts – (\$80,000)

Cisco smart net, backup storage, checkpoint, barracuda, chromebook repairs, A+ Technology & Security

#### BOCES – Learning Technology – (\$2,405,000)

- Researching student attendance tracking system
- E-rate cabling projects
- Digital I-pad pens
- Chromebook leases and insurance
- Custom Computer tech support
- Various software licenses
- Monitoring solution s- web filters
- Internet services
- Increase in bandwidth

## INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY (CONT'D)

- BOCES East Instructional Technology (\$75,000)
  - Aimsweb
  - Data Mining
- Supplies (\$185,000)
  - Ink, toner, projectors, printers, maker space supplies
- Software Supplies (\$187,740)
  - Renewal of various software licenses
  - Google Enterprise
