Dear Deer Park Community:

On Tuesday, May 15, residents in the Deer Park UFSD community will head to the polls to vote on the proposed 2018-2019 budget, which is once again within the tax cap, at 2.21 percent. The proposed budget totaling \$112,508,977 carries a 3.06 percent budget-to-budget increase, or \$3,344,389 over last year.

To help offset the cost to taxpayers, the district will receive a total of \$28,930,352 in state aid, which is an increase of \$1,075,525 from the previous year. Furthermore, the district will use \$691,306 from reserves and realize cost savings from retirements throughout the district, which



in addition to state aid will minimize the overall cost impact to our community. The Board of Education and district administration spent several months crafting a budget that remains fiscally responsible while continuing our valuable programs and services for all students. We are very excited to present this sound budget to our taxpayers. The plan will also add security enhancements, technology initiatives and instructional programs that will continue to provide our students with the comprehensive education and welcoming learning environment they deserve.

As always, we are committed to minimizing the overall tax impact to our taxpayers and continue to find efficiencies when crafting our budget each year. The budget plan meets all of our expectations and goals. An annual budget contains estimates of revenues and expenditures, and the actual financial results will differ from the budget. As noted by the Office of the State Comptroller: "A certain amount of the budget should be set aside for contingencies (either with a line item, or through the use of fund balances or reserves), to allow for the smooth operation of government in case of emergencies or minor errors in calculating revenues or expenditures." In the event that any surplus funds are available at the end of the fiscal year, the Board of Education will determine the best use of these funds, which may include using these funds to reduce taxes, maintain programs, fund the unappropriated, undesignated reserve as allowed by law at a maximum of 4 percent of the subsequent year's budget and/or fund other reserves.

# FAQs

## Q: What are a school district budget's main components?

A: There are two accounting segments that comprise the district budget – expenditures and revenues. Expenditures are calculated for



instruction, central services, transportation and other categories listed in the "Expenditures" chart. The district derives revenue to fund expenditures from the tax levy, state aid, payments in lieu of taxes (PILOTs) from Suffolk County for businesses operating in Deer Park, interest on account balances, BOCES reimbursements and related services as seen on the "Estimated Revenues" chart. The budget must be structured to balance expenditures with anticipated revenues.

#### Q: What is the difference between the tax levy and the tax rate?

A: The tax levy is the amount of money the Board of Education requests from the Town of Babylon in order to balance the budget after state aid and other revenues are taken into consideration. The tax rate is not set by the Board of Education. The town assessor calculates the assessed valuation of the properties in the Town of Babylon from which the tax rate is calculated. It is important to note that the tax levy limit applies only to the school district's tax levy, not the tax rate or an individual tax bill.

#### Q: What is a contingency budget?

A: Should voters defeat the proposed budget on May 15, the budget may be presented for one more vote prior to July. If the Board opts not to have a second vote, it can immediately adopt a contingency budget, which would force the district to operate with a zero percent tax levy increase under the state's tax cap law. If a second proposed budget is defeated, the district must, by law, adopt at zero percent.

# VOTER INFORMATION

Voter Eligibility and Registration:

Deer Park residents are urged to vote in all school district elections. To cast your ballot in the May 15 budget vote and Board trustee election, you must be:

- A citizen of the United States.
- 18 years of age or older (we encourage eligible students to exercise their right to vote).
- A resident of the Deer Park School District for 30 days prior to vote.
- Registered to vote with the Suffolk County Board of Elections, or registered with the school district.

Registration is required if you have not voted within four years in a general election or school election. Registration will be held on:

- Wednesday, May 2, Administration Building, 9 a.m.-1 p.m.
- Tuesday, May 8, Administration Building, 9 a.m.-1 p.m.
- Thursday, May 10, John F. Kennedy Intermediate School, 4 p.m.-8 p.m.
