Cultural Awareness:

Deer Park's Pride and Joy

In a district comprised of so many diverse people, cultural awareness throughout Deer Park is more vital and important than ever, enriching the school community and curriculum and creating an environment of cultural exploration, acceptance, appreciation and tolerance.

JFK promotes acceptance through the daily morning Words of Wisdom readings over the PA system that focus on promoting kindness, empathy and acceptance of different cultures. The school's third-grade social studies curriculum focuses on cultures around the world, enriched by classroom visits from family speakers who deliver firsthand information on their cultures.

The ENL programs are a core source, with staff members working alongside classroom teachers and other faculty to ensure that cultural awareness and tolerance are themes that unite the schools' diverse student populations. Earlier this year, ENL students performed on Family Fun Night as a celebration of love and unity. At the recent districtwide International Poetry Festival, ENL and world language students of all ages, some wearing traditional attire, recited original poems in their native languages and sang songs using sign language, cultural props and flags. On World Language Exploration Day at both primary schools, high school seniors studying Spanish, Italian and French visited classrooms to teach language lessons to the younger students.


"We began the year discussing our native countries and languages," said ENL teacher Vanessa Pizzo. "We made passports and suitcases displayed in the hallways, recognizing the different countries and languages spoken."

"Creating safe, multicultural environments for our ENL students is one of our primary goals," said ENL teacher Ashley Rosenberg. "Within our classroom, students are encouraged to share their backgrounds and use their native languages in order to better understand content. We also strive to use a diverse body of multicultural texts so that information is accessible to all students. All our students have become more tolerant global citizens."

Special Education Committee •

Chaired by Board Vice President Donna Marie Elliott and trustee Keith Rooney, the Special Education Committee meets to discuss different ways to enrich the lives of the district's special needs students through such activities as school dances, clubs, talent shows, district internships, and sports and socialization groups. By integrating general education students as helpers in these endeavors, the committee has fostered disability awareness and acceptance within the school community.

"Our committee is important to the school community because we have provided skill-based programs, social and athletic programs, and safe social outlets for our special needs students to find acceptance and foster friendships," said Elliott.

"This is critical for Deer Park students to be successful, learn important life skills and build their self-esteem," added Rooney. "The committee tries to give every child a chance to be successful, regardless of any obstacles they may have to endure."

Rooney and Elliott see their roles as being a voice for the committee as a whole, bringing light to issues and communicating requests and suggestions to the superintendent and other Board members.

"My approach is collaboration," said Rooney. "No idea is off the table. We follow tasks and try to drive positive change in the community."

Their goals for special needs students include building confidence and selfesteem, instilling real-world life skills, and helping them push themselves to reach educational goals, network and form relationships, and ultimately find a place in the workforce. Among their proudest achievements are secondary school dances, provided in conjunction with the Special Education Parent Faculty Club, and the after school social skills program, funded by an annual grant, and sports groups such as the bowling league and an after school athletic club.

ENL Committee

The ENL Committee, chaired by trustees Donna Gulli Grunseich and Kristine Rosales, is a forum for both staff and community members of the ENL community to come together to help improve the experiences of and offer suggestions to the district's ENL students and families. The committee's goal is to help ease the educational transition of these students and their families into the school and community, empowering them to succeed.

"Deer Park has a growing ENL population and we need to make

sure we enable, to the best of our abilities, a good educational experience for all," said Rosales, who noted that she and Gulli Grunseich approach their committee roles more like moderators, providing structure to


Your Committees at Work

Board members, administrators, district staff and parents play a vital role in the district's five committees, working to address necessary issues and support important projects

Facilities & Grounds Committee

The Facilities & Grounds Committee, chaired by trustee Robert Marino, reviews the educational needs of the district's students and ensures that the facilities are able to accommodate those needs through constant improvements and the recommendation of upgrades and enhancements. The committee, which also includes trustee Al Centamore, conducts walk-throughs of the buildings and grounds on a regular basis.

"We try to provide and maintain an appropriate space to enable our educators to teach our students," said Marino. "Whether it be science or sports, language arts or athletics, orchestra or marching band, they all need appropriate spaces. As chairman, I focus on the progression of current projects, then inquire about additional or new projects."



"Our primary goal is to ensure the health and safety of our children," said Centamore. "We also consult with the experts, engineers, architects and our facilities administrator about our roofs, curtain walls, heating, lighting, science labs and parking lots, and collaborate with our principals, staff and community members to prioritize the needs of our students and the costs associated with each project."

Technology Committee •

The Technology Committee is jointly chaired by Board President John Gouskos and Christopher Kauter, the district's administrator of instructional technology. The committee discusses all of the district's technology-related initiatives, developing and reviewing timelines and goals at each meeting, with continued follow-up on existing projects to ensure they are meeting the district's current needs.

"Our goal is to collaboratively plan a strategic roadmap to ensure the school district is future-ready," said Gouskos,

whose approach to his role as co-chairman begins with obtaining direct feedback from stakeholders. He then seeks to align the needs of each building to commonsense solutions and address any concerns which may arise.

The Technology Committee is particularly proud of its role in supporting the increased use of social media by Deer Park staff members to showcase events and student achievement throughout the school district and community.



Wellness Committee •

Chaired by Board Vice President Donna Marie Elliott, the Wellness Committee serves as a crucial forum to allow each building representative to bring up concerns and suggestions from their building's safety and health response teams, and communicate these concerns to upper management.

"This committee provides the ability to bring building concerns to light, enabling our district to continue to keep the safety and health of all students, staff and visitors at the forefront of our operations," said Elliott. "Our goal is total districtwide communication, from buildings to district office."

As chairwoman, Elliott leads meetings and ensures that enough time is provided for sufficient discussion so that any building and community concerns can be heard.

"I am most proud of facilitating discussion among community members, building representatives, the district office and our facilities administrator, allowing for identification and resolution to district concerns and issues," she said.

Too Good for Drugs Program Helps JFK Students Make Good Choices

JFK introduced the Too Good for Drugs prevention program this year, designed to reduce risk factors for alcohol, tobacco and other drug use. The program, provided through a Hope for Youth grant, developed the social and emotional skills that students need for making healthy choices, building positive friendships, communicating effectively and resisting peer pressure. It ran over a 10-week period, with an instructor presenting a weekly 40-minute lesson to JFK's fourth- and fifth-grade classes. The students learned how to surround themselves with positive influences and make good choices when negative ones are presented.

"Our students really enjoyed role-playing and discussing some of the pressures of being a kid today," said Associate Principal Kelly Benson, who initiated the program at JFK.
