I look around and I'm proud of our graduates, our faculty, our families and our community, of all that we managed to accomplish over the last year, and of getting to this moment."

"As we move on tonight, there are many lessons that you can take from your high school experience," Principal Charles Cobb told his seniors. After the diplomas were conferred, tassels turned and caps tossed, the new graduates walked out of the stadium as proud Falcons alumni, ready for their next challenge.


