


Students Receive Personal Technology for Advanced Learning



The district launched its fifth-grade one-to-one laptop program with the distribution of Apple MacBooks to every student. The innovative program, coined "Kristin Green Apple of Our Eye Initiative," was dedicated in memory of Class of 2007 graduate Kristin Green and equips students with tools for 21st century learning.

John F. Kennedy Intermediate students, accompanied by an adult, arrived at their school and received a personal MacBook from fifth-grade teachers and district administrators. Students secured their laptops with protective covers for transport and everyday use and completed the registration process in the school's computer lab. Apple employees were on hand to assist students with their initial log-in and reviewed the standard installed software. In addition, students received a MacBook gift bag complete with power charger, memory card and other computer accessories.

The next school day students brought their laptops to class and began using the technology to support academic research

and lesson plans. Teachers tailored their lessons to create an interactive learning environment in all curricular areas. Students had the ability to solve math problems utilizing visual aids, create literary logs and explore multi-media presentations. To support the use of the laptops teachers combined instructional technology tools such as SMARTBoards and projectors to enhance learning.

Prior to introducing the program, all students and parents of fifth graders were required to attend a training workshop facilitated by Apple professionals to review topics such as the Required Use Policy, MacBook Care and Internet Safety.

As we have now reached the halfway mark of the school year, I am proud to report that our

students are continuing to achieve, both in and outside of the classroom. Students throughout our district have been selected to perform during county and regional music festivals, six of our fall athletic teams were named NYS Scholar-Athlete Teams based on their cumulative grade point averages, three seniors were selected by some of the nation's top colleges to sign Letters of Intent, and our Class of 2011 Top 10 students, who are pictured on page one, are a strong representation of the sound educational program Deer Park provides.

Throughout the remainder of the year, our schools will continue to hold fundraisers and events to help support Karl and benefit the Zaharia family.

The arrival of winter marked the official start to our district's budget planning process, which will

culminate in the annual budget vote on Tuesday, May 17, 2011. Beginning in March, we will be devoting time during each of our Board of Education meetings to discuss the development of the 2011-2012 school budget. Given the economic climate we are currently faced with, coupled with our new governor's proposal of a potential tax cap, this year's budget process is certain to be a challenging one.

Deer Park Unveils Energy Efficiency Plan Set to Save District Millions

The district, in partnership with the Long Island Power Authority, National Grid and Johnson Controls, has developed a comprehensive Energy Efficiency Plan that will save the district money while simultaneously protecting the environment. Following an internal audit, district administrators and Buildings and Grounds team, the Energy Committee and the Board of Education worked to streamline proactive energy initiatives that would most benefit the school's students and community.

These proactive measures, which will produce residual effects for the next eighteen years, will generate an annual energy savings of \$555,000 with an approximate \$23,000 reduction in operations and maintenance costs. As a result of the facility and infrastructure upgrades, the district will benefit from a positive cash flow of approximately \$5.2 million over the next 18 years. To offset funding costs, the district has qualified for LIPA Energy Rebates totaling \$86,000 and 52% School Building Aid Ratio.

In addition to the savings, the district's green movement will also positively impact the environment. Through the more efficient use of resources, the district, in the first year, will save 311,960 gallons of gasoline, eliminate more than 1.3 million kilowatt hours, and reduce carbon dioxide emissions by more than 6 million pounds.

Through the collaborative efforts of the Deer Park educational community and energy experts, a proactive plan for the district has been created. Board of Education member and Energy Chairman Keith Rooney described the process and goals, stating, "We have used the past several years to assess the district's energy use and subsequently created a proactive plan that will save money while creating more efficient buildings. Not only will our schools and community realize a reduction in costs, but we will also provide a cleaner environment for our students to learn in."

The success of the energy plan was made possible due to a strong network of corporate partners. "LIPA is pleased to partner with the Deer Park School District, to give their students a more energy efficient and an environmentally responsible learning institution and will give them a first-hand look at what it means to be leaders in energy efficiency," said LIPA Vice President of Environmental Affairs, Michael J. Deering.

The district's Buildings and Grounds crew will implement upgrades throughout the school year and aim to have all projects completed in a year and a half. Highlights of the district-wide energy efficiency plan include:

- 1. Replacement of inefficient lighting district-wide
- 2. Installation of lighting occupancy sensors district-wide
- 3. Improvement of the weatherization and insulation of all school buildings
- 4. Installation of an Energy Management System that controls all buildings, set points and schedules
- 5. Boiler replacements at JFK Intermediate and May Moore Elementary Schools
- 6. Window replacements at the Abraham Lincoln School
- 7. Installation of computer management system to control all desktop computers district-wide

Students Connect Using TECHINOLOGY

The high school and May Moore Elementary School combined instructional technology tools and educational resources to provide students district wide with a unique learning opportunity. In a program introduced as "Bridging SMARTBoards

Across the District," students at the high school had the ability to connect with younger students to complete joint lessons. High school students in Jill Perry-Eising's business class interacted with Susan Steinman's second-grade students, creating a virtual classroom experience.

To culminate the elementary curriculum unit on money, high school students directed a variety of activities focused on coins. Students worked together using SMARTBoards, MacBooks and Document and Web Cameras to solve problems that covered different money topics.

High school students first instructed elementary students on the skills necessary to complete each task. Working individually as well as a team, elementary students displayed their work on the SMARTBoards through the use of visual aids such as coin images, cash registers and piggy banks.

Students Take Top Spots in Business Competition

Several high school students successfully competed in Adelphi University's Apprentice Competition claiming first and second place. Business students from across Long Island were challenged to develop an advertising campaign for Snapple products and create a marketing strategy for a holiday film. After formulating their projects, teams presented their ideas and plans of action to a panel of judges from Adelphi University.

The high school's championship students credited the district's business curriculum for their successes in the apprentice competition. The high school offers

He took students through the scientific process, explaining and discussing with students the supplies needed, proper procedure and chemical reactions in each experiment. For the grand finale, students had the opportunity to ride atop a Hover Craft as Scientist William described the mechanics of the "floating" vehicle.

The unique community service project aimed to collect personal care items for the residents of Our Lady of Consolation Nursing and Rehabilitation Care Center. Thanks to the generous donations made by the school's students and faculty members, each resident received a gift bag filled with essential personal care items. During the drive, the students collected a variety of toiletry products, such as lotion, toothpaste, combs, shampoo, cotton swabs and body spray. Student Council members came together to sort and create individual care packages for the senior citizens.

TEACHER Spotlight

Robert Frost Middle School eighth-grade English teacher Carla DeVito, a valued member of the district's educational community, has been recognized as a 2010 Educator of Excellence by the New York State English Council. Ms. DeVito was nominated by Associate Principal Gary Ramonetti for her ability to inspire excellence in students, as well as fellow teachers.

As an educator, Ms. DeVito works to enhance curriculum with instructional technology tools and motivates students to explore literacy through unique perspectives. In order to

connect students to their work and with one another, she created a classroom Wiki Space for students to use as an interactive portal to share content. Through the English-focused website, students have the ability to review classroom materials, engage in Literature Circles, and view Author Spotlights. Students also use the website to post book reports and writing assignments, creating a forum for discussion and insight on their works. In addition, Ms. DeVito teaches students to expand their creative horizons by transforming literary works into visual features. Students craft scripts, develop characters, and ultimatley produce short movies.

Ms. DeVito works throughout the school year to ensure student growth as individual and group learners. She states, "My goal is to create a student-driven environment where students learn from one another. I encourage my students to take literature to the next level by integrating other curricular areas into their reading and writing experiences."

To reinforce this method, Ms. DeVito introduced students to the Greek language during their studies of ancient mythology in order to highlight the cultural and historical aspects of the literary lessons.

As a result of Ms. DeVito's efforts, middle school students are equipped with the extensive writing skills and interest in the world of literature that are needed for success in high school and beyond.

Student Musicians Excel in the Arts

The district works together to educate the whole student and provide each with opportunities to showcase and enhance their talents. Four fine and performing arts students were selected to participate in the Long Island String Festival and performed during the organization's county-wide ensembles. High School student Noah Roff played the viola, along with high school violinist Catherine Xie and Robert Frost Middle School violinist Juliet Quirindongo who performed in the Suffolk Secondary Festival. Robert Frost Middle School student Nicholas Dimodica represented the district in the Suffolk Elementary Festival, playing the violin.

In addition, several district elementary students were chosen to participate in the PEAK Festival, sponsored by the Suffolk County Music Educators Association (SCMEA). PEAK, which stands for "Parents, Educators And Kids," is a special program for musically talented fourth graders in which students, parents and music teachers participate in a variety of musical workshops to hone and enhance students' skills and broaden their interests in music. WARNING ON CHILDREN'S MEDICATION DOSAGE

Researchers from medical schools have found inconsistencies in almost 99 percent of the products tested between dosing directions on the labels of children's medications and the markings on the medicine cups in which they were packaged. Two hundred top-selling pediatric liquid-over-the-counter medications of 2009 were tested. Of the products tested, about a quarter of them lacked necessary markings, over 80 percent had unnecessary or superfluous markings, and in 89 percent of them, the text on the label didn't match the unit of measurement on the measuring device. New legislation has been introduced to ensure consistency in children's medicine cups. Please check your children's medication labels for accuracy.
