## Debut Track Invitational



# DEVINE HONORED AS OUTSTANDING SENIOR SCIENCE STUDENT

Senior and valedictorian Kyle Devine was honored as the school's Outstanding Senior Science Student at the 39th annual Awards Dinner of the Suffolk Section of the Science Teachers Association of New York State. Devine, a well-rounded and extraordinarily gifted student, was chosen for the award by the school's science department based on his outstanding science achievements throughout his high school career.

This year's Suffolk Section awards ceremony, held at the Hyatt Regency Long Island, showcased honorees from 30 different school districts, each of whom received an engraved plaque to commemorate their achievement. More than 100 attendees were on hand to congratulate the students, including Devine's mentor, science teacher David Knuffke.

"Kyle is one of the most academically talented students whom I have ever worked with, and he is also more loved and respected by more facets of our community than I can recall any one student ever being," said Knuffke.

# Sibling Scientists Compete at BROOKHAVEN NATIONAL LAB'S SCIENCE FAIR

Two of the district's dedicated young scientists, siblings Brendan Eising and Kayley Eising, won honorable mention at Brookhaven National Laboratory's annual Elementary School Science Fair. To compete in the BNL Elementary School Science Fair, the 500 participating students from 120 different Suffolk County schools were

required to win first or second place in their own school's science fair. At JFK's science fair, Brendan won first place in the fifth grade, while his sister Kayley was the second-place winner for the third grade.

Brendan's project, "Pink-Eye Pad, a Touchy Subject," explored his hypothesis that since an iPad can only be cleaned with a lint-free cloth, it would contain more germs than a computer keyboard because the latter can be sanitized with a cleaning agent such as bleach.

Kayley's project, titled "My Brother and Matt Harvey, Torn Apart," inspired by injuries to her brother and the Mets pitcher, sought to determine how an injured ligament affects throwing distance.

Continuing a longstanding Deer Park tradition, Class of 2004 valedictorian Nicholas Porcaro returned as a guest speaker, offering Rocky Balboa as a model of determination and providing this year's graduates a synopsis of Porcaro's rise, fall and eventually successful career reinvention in the business world.


Salutatorian Andreas Stamatakis told his peers that what they learned in their studies would not be enough to prepare them for adult life beyond

high school. "Today we take a step toward a unique period of our lives, a time when our lack of preparation is our greatest strength," he said. "When challenges come, and they undoubtedly will, we have the greatest chance to do something unique and innovative in the face of adversity."

In his speech as class valedictorian, Harvardbound Kyle Devine discussed the value of uncertainty and adversity in forging the future. "Here we stand on the outskirts of adulthood, but no matter how we approach the future, there's so much of it that remains a mystery," he said. "While we may know who we are today, we still are yet to discover who we'll become, but it's nothing to worry about – we have a lifetime to figure that out. You can set as clear a path as you want right now, but never panic if there's an obstacle blocking your way or you decide that you want to take a left instead of a right. Instead, immerse yourself in the possibilities that the world has to offer you and that you have to offer the world."

After the candidates for graduation were introduced and diplomas conferred and awarded by district administrators and members of the Board of Education, the excited new graduates flung their caps skyward, and proceeded out to the strains of Elmer Bernstein's "The Great Escape," performed by the Deer Park High School Symphonic Band.

# Winners for the Environment

and only 10 prizes were awarded.

opportunity each year as part of an initiative to encourage young scientists to research renewable energy sources, greenhouse gas reduction and the development of alternative building materials.

Covanta also recognized three artistically ambitious JFK students as prize winners in the company's recycling poster contest, which required Long Island elementary-level students to illustrate the importance of recycling. ## Spring Athletes Recognized

Nine high school sports teams were honored at the spring athletic awards ceremony, with eight of these teams – varsity baseball, varsity softball, varsity boys lacrosse, varsity girls lacrosse, varsity boys golf, varsity girls golf, varsity boys track, and varsity girls track – named Scholar/Athlete teams by the New York State Public High School Athletic Association, a recognition that requires teams to have at least five players and earn a cumulative team GPA of 90 percent or higher.
