Sitework Projects at May Moore a Plus for Many



The District continues to work through the summer on enhancing the schools. Parking lot and driveway improvements were conducted at May Moore Primary School this July (as seen here). While parents and staff at the school will benefit from this, the entire community, specifically student-athletes, will benefit from the creation of a new athletic field at May Moore. Field construction will be completed by the spring where the new field will primarily be used by the Girl's Varsity lacrosse team in order to alleviate scheduling conflicts between first season program Robert Frost Middle School 7th and 8th grade girl's lacrosse team and Deer Park High School. It will also provide additional recreation options for the community when the fields are not in use by District teams.

New Food Service Director Hopes to provide a 'Healthy' Hand

The Board of Education has appointed Aramark Education K-12 as the District's new food service provider. Culinary professional Sergio Tenaglia will oversee Aramark's service to Deer Park as Director of Food Services.

Mr. Tenaglia gained valuable culinary knowledge and hands-on experience while working in his family's restaurant Mario's Pizza & Restaurant and honed his management and business skills at the age of 16, when he took ownership of his own location. Attending Johnson & Wales University, College of



Culinary Arts, he majored in Hospitality Management. After graduation, Mr. Tenaglia joined the Aramark family, working in school districts across Long Island, including Oyster Bay and Connetquot as a General Manager in charge of food services.

Providing students with high-quality, healthy and tasty food with a more expansive variety that ensures ample portions and proper daily nutrition is the primary goal of the new Director of Food Services. Mr. Tenaglia also values a productive and healthy work environment for cafeteria staff, and believes these things will effectively translate into an enhanced service for students.

Creating More Efficient, Environmentally Friendly Schools

BOARD OF ED INITIATIVES WILL CONSERVE ENERGY, YIELD FISCAL SAVINGS

An energy audit was completed at all nine District buildings at no cost to taxpayers. The Board of Education also approved an agreement with Keyspan Energy to secure four new high-efficiency boilers at Deer Park High School, producing thousands of dollars in LIPA rebates and saving the district a projected \$400,000 per year in utility expenditures.

The new boilers will be provided at no cost to taxpayers and will reduce natural gas and fuel oil consumption (going from a 70% efficiency rating to 95%). In addition, the recommission of six cogeneration units, already in place at District buildings, will utilize natural gas to generate electricity. These changes will also reduce the amount of carbon emissions by 752 cubic tons (current levels meet EPA safety standards), which is the equivalent to planting 1,000 trees.

The Board of Education is also exploring opportunities for solar energy and improved heating and ventilation, working with its Green Committee and Johnson Controls. The benefits are also being weighed of converting (not replacing) the existing bus fleet to "clean air" buses that run on natural gas.

Light sensors will be installed at every school in the District, beginning with the largest schools: the high school and Robert Frost Middle School next year. The sensors will automatically turn off lights when a room is unoccupied, conserving electricity. This project will pay for itself after just two and

a half months. Energy-efficient gymnasium lighting has also been installed at JFK Intermediate School.


Most recently, Deer Park High School hosted Congressman Steve Israel, as he joined school officials in announcing the results of the Long Island Superintendents Survey on Rising Energy Costs. The survey, conducted with National Grid,

examined 17 Long Island school districts' energy costs, usage, equipment and efficiency, and concluded that energy expenditures for schools have doubled since the 1999-2000 school year.

Congressman Israel was also given a tour of the high school's boiler room. Many of the school districts on Long Island, including Deer Park, have future plans in the works to "go green." Congressman Israel has been leading the effort to secure federal funds for renovations that would enable schools to operate greener. He previously authored federal legislation to provide federal matching funds (up to 50% of a project's total cost) to school districts implementing state guidelines through investment in energy-efficiency upgrades and renewable energy technology.



Board of Education members presented awards for exceptional academic and extracurricular achievements, including the Presidential Academic Achievement Award, National Junior Honor Society and various departmental awards. Student Council President Diana Cotrone and Robert Frost Class of 2008 members Nirvana Goberdhan, Casey McKenna and Lateefah Hawthorne spoke about the unity of their class, and how they have grown both as individuals and as a group, learning from their teachers as well as one another. DISTRICT APPOINTS NEW ADMINISTRATOR OF INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY

The District welcomes the new Administrator for Instructional Technology Dr. Jared Bloom. Dr. Bloom gained expertise in the field while working in various expanding technology companies. He later became a high school and middle school English teacher, a position he held for the last seven years both in New York City and on Long Island.

Possessing a strong educational résumé, Dr. Bloom received a PhD in Administration from Capella University and a Master's in Secondary English from Hofstra University. He has authored scholarly articles for the prestigious New York State English Council, for which he served as the Chair of the Technology Committee, combining his passions for literacy and technology.



Dr. Bloom's dissertation focused on extending the classroom by utilizing technological advancements to connect students, parents and teachers with an entire educational community in order to reinforce daily lessons and provide supplemental information. An Adjunct at Hofstra University since 2005, his work at the University helped create the Sunset Seminar Group, a staff development program for school teachers to learn the latest computer and digital technology for classroom instruction. A language arts and technology consultant for elementary and secondary programs, Dr. Bloom has introduced technology education and English best practices at workshops throughout the United States.

As a new administrator in Deer Park, Dr. Bloom plans to improve the entire technology infrastructure of the District by rebuilding the system from the back end. This will include server upgrades to improve backup, reduce power consumption, and improve the speed of the District's entire computer network. He also intends to add 130 new Dell computers for instructional and administrative purposes, plus additional computers for the elementary classrooms and will look to build a more functional District website to be utilized by students, parents, teachers, administrators and community members as a unifying resource. Dr. Bloom also looks forward to working with the teaching staff to support their efforts and help students capitalize on the available technology and productively utilize their knowledge in today's global society.

JFK Students Spur Biodegradable Action

Inspired by their class curriculum, John F. Kennedy environmentally conscious students Gabriellia Mattera and Taylor Kwintner brought their green ideas to the Board of Education. Combining common concerns of healthy lunches for students and a healthy environment for the world, the girls employed their knowledge of math, science, and English to investigate Deer Park and New York State's waste production and waste management resources.

Gabriella and Taylor researched official state materials online, reviewed printed literature, analyzed statistics, and conducted



student surveys and interviews to proposed a scenario where the District could participate in a global green movement. With the help of their teacher, Jennifer Arella (pictured here with the Gabriella and Taylor), they prepared a detailed visual presentation for the Board of Education, which documented the amount of nonbiodegradable Styrofoam used by the district annually. As a result, in its Request for Proposals for a new food service provider, the Board included a provision that prohibits qualifiers from using Styrofoam food trays, or any Styrofoam products in the Deer Park schools.

Aramark Food Services, which has an excellent history of working with public K-12 school districts, colleges and universities, conference centers and professional sports complexes, and parks and resorts, was ultimately selected.

"It makes us all proud to see two young students use their curriculum knowledge and motivation to launch a grass-roots campaign and research project to better their community and effect positive change," said Superintendent of Schools Elizabeth Marino. "Deer Park is moving towards becoming a 'greener District' and it's nice to see students getting into the act."

14 DPHS Students Place 1st in Jury Service Competition

Fourteen Deer Park High School Business Law students have been awarded first place in the New York State Court System's Annual Media Contest. Business teacher Annemarie Lenio and her students attended an awards and recognition ceremony held at the District Courthouse in Central Islip. In honor of the winners, jury duty was cancelled for the day.

This year's contest centered on "Jury Service." Ms. Lenio's class submitted entries in a comprehensive set of categories, including a public service announcement which was created by Chris Ottersen, a poster designed by James Doyle and Mark Stevens, a juror orientation video produced by Alicia Messina, Ben Xerri, Alexa Sande, and Chris Rafferty, and slide show presentations by Sydney Bond, Briana Jones, Justin Balestrieri, Ekta Patel, Mojdeh Ghanbarian, Jerome Whitfield, and Michael Rodriguez.

The goal of the program is to encourage high school students to raise public awareness about the importance of serving as a juror. Students created in-depth projects to help increase citizen participation in our jury system and ensure that New York juries reflect the rich diversity of the state and nation.

Upon arrival to the Courthouse Central Jury Room, students were greeted by key figures in New York State's judicial system including Judge W. Gerard Asher, Commissioner of Jurors Michael D. O'Donohoe, Deputy Commissioner Gerald Hemendinger, and Senior Court Analyst Annette Kalotkin. Students had the rare opportunity to visit Judge Asher's courtroom

while it was in session and observed the legal proceedings in a live format. The class also met with Police Liaison for the courts and jail Lieutenant William Hasper, who described how he became a police lieutenant and arranged for students to witness the latest electronic fingerprinting technology process.

Helping People Back on their Feet



Class of 2008 graduate Kristen Calder was honored for her exemplary volunteer service with a New York State Certificate of Excellence from the 2008 Prudential Spirit of Community Awards program. Kristen was nominated and selected for this award due to her dedication and commitment to helping others in the community.

Inspired by a magazine article that described the staggering number of children who cannot afford shoes that fit them properly, Kristen developed a program that collects shoes for needy families in her community.
