Six-Time Marching Band Champs will Parade in Washington on July 4th

The Deer Park High School Marching Falcons, under the direction of Tammy Cotrone and Jaimee Cilla, have been selected to represent the state of New York in the 2008 National Independence Day Parade in Washington, D.C. on July 4th. The Marching Falcons have been the USSBA State Champions for the past six years and will join government officials, military units, sponsored floats, and other specialty outfits in this national event.

The United States Department of the Interior and National Park Service, along with the National Selection Committee, chose Deer Park High School based on their review of video and audio tapes, recommendations of state music officials, past achievements, and current competition ratings.

The Marching Falcons will parade on historical Constitution Avenue in front of an anticipated audience of 450,000 spectators and participate in the laying of an Official Military Wreath at Arlington National Cemetery. The traditional parade will be a reflection of many American patriotic themes, historical and present, but the major emphasis in 2008 will be the "Salute to America's Greatest Generation."

15 Earn AP Honors

Fifteen students at Deer Park High School have earned the designation of AP Scholar by the College Board in recognition of their exceptional achievement on the college-level Advanced Placement (AP) program exams.

The College Board's AP Program offers students the opportunity to take challenging college-level courses while still in high school, and to receive college credit, Advanced Placement, or both for successful performance on the AP Exam. Students at Deer Park High School took their AP Exams in May 2007 after completing their courses. The College Board recognizes several levels of achievement based on students' performance on the AP Exams and Deer Park students were among the top ranked.

Alexander W. qualified for the AP Scholar with Distinction Award by earning an average grade of at least 3.5 out of 5 on all AP Exams taken. Three students, Christopher D., Melissa E. and Lauren S., were all named AP Scholars with Honors by earning an average of at least 3.25 on all AP Exams taken. Finally, an impressive 11 students were recognized with the AP Scholar Award by completing three or more AP Exams with grades of 3 or higher. Three Honored by

NATIONAL MERIT CORP. FOR EXCELLENCE

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation has recognized three Deer Park High School seniors for excellence. Kristen M. has been named a Semifinalist in the National Merit Scholarship program; Tae Ken K. has been named a National Merit Commended student; and Allison N. was named a Scholar-Finalist of the National Hispanic Scholarship Program.

Kristen has been recognized as a semifinalist based on her superior performance on the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT). She is one of approximately 16,000 students, or one-third of 50,000 high-scoring entrants. As a semifinalist Kristen represents the top half of one percent of United States high school seniors and is included in the highest scoring entrants in New York State. Finalists for the National Merit Scholarship will be announced this winter, with winners to be announced in the spring.

Tae Ken has also been recognized by the program as a National Merit Commended Student. More than 1.4 million juniors in nearly 21,000 high schools entered the 2008 National Merit Program and Kim is one of 34,000 students in the top five percent nationwide who received letters of commendation for his outstanding PSAT results. Tae Ken is also the recipient of the Bausch & Lomb Honorary Science Award from the University of Rochester for his outstanding performance in science.

Allison is a Scholar-Finalist for the National Hispanic Scholarship Program. She is recognized as one of approximately 3,300 of the highest scoring students from a nationwide total of 196,000 Hispanic high school students who took the PSAT. As a result of her achievements, the College Board will identify and recommend her to postsecondary educational institutions.

UPGRADING TECHNOLOGY

This fall, the District's Management Information Systems (MIS) Department deployed new technology resources and a comprehensive suite of applications, along with training and support opportunities for the District's students, teachers, administrators, and support personnel.

New hardware and software are being used at all schools. New computers replaced obsolete equipment in the computer labs of the John Quincy Adams and May Moore Primary Schools. Other computers were upgraded with RAM (Random Access Memory), new operating systems, and applications – including those in the classrooms at Deer Park High School. Xerox copiers were integrated into the District's network, allowing them to replace obsolete copiers and printers. New software applications were added to student, teacher, and office computers, including an enhanced, Webbased automated library system. SMARTBoards, which are

interactive whiteboards used by teachers and students, have been placed in all schools.

Additionally, the MIS Department continues to instruct personnel in the many application resources available in Deer Park Schools for the purposes of improving student learning outcomes, providing enhanced services, and ensuring a higher level of District productivity and management.

eCommerce Plan Wins Best in NY State

Deer Park High School eCommerceEd and Small Business Management students, known as "Binger's Bunch," under the guidance of teacher Nancy Binger, have won the award for "Best Written Business Plan in New York State" for their ScoresUp websites. Both of Ms. Binger's eCommEd classes, comprised of a combined total of 100 students, received the coveted honor for running and maintaining the live District websites based on their detailed plan of action for a successful business.

Both business plans were described by the judges as "well researched" and "professionally written," with very specific task descriptions and objectives. The students' plan enables the two e-businesses to operate with relative ease and thrive, with consistent performance assessment and tools for the sites/businesses to grow. The latest accolade for "Binger's Bunch" places them in strong candidacy for the annual ScoresUp Site of the Year Awards.

Technicians from Brookhaven National Laboratory (BNL) conducted a hands-on training session for Deer Park High School students who are enrolled in chemistry and physics and are actively taking part in BNL's modern physics experiments.

Deer Park High School has been home

to a cosmic ray analytical device on loan from BNL. It is currently the location for one of the data collecting stations in the area for the Mixed Apparatus for Radar Investigation of Atmospheric Cosmic-Rays of High Ionization (MARIACHI).

The students built a detector station that works in tandem with detector stations at Stony Brook

University and Brookhaven National Lab. Deer Park students built detectors that catalogue and count cosmic particles, and most critical, cosmic ray showers, which enter our atmosphere and reach the surface of the earth.

Deer Park High School Advanced

Placement Physics teacher Joseph Sundermier and Chemistry teacher Theodore Smirlis have been instrumental in bringing this program to Deer Park High School. Deer Park students have been exposed to Long Island's leading scientists and researchers, such as Senior BNL Physicist Helio Takai, who has been at the forefront of developing these complex programs that utilize student scientists.

"We decided we would involve students in research projects to explain the physics and how the equipment works," said Mr. Takai. "We have developed experiments and demonstrations together with teachers and have incorporated students into the research. The results have been a very good experience."

Certified Mediators

Twenty-five students and eight teachers participated in a new Conflict Resolution and Mediation program at Robert Frost Middle School. Each participant was trained in three two-hour sessions during the school day and received a certificate as a trained conflict mediator upon completion. The purpose of the program is to teach



students on how to assist their peers in working through problems that are so often an issue during the middle school years. Students learned the life skills necessary to peacefully solve these problems.



Rising to the Challenge

Deer Park High School Senior James P. is the proud recipient of the Suffolk County Youth Bureau's "Celebrating Youth" Achievement Award. Presented by Suffolk County Executive Steve Levy, James was selected for this honor based on his demonstration of growth and personal achievement through adversity and challenges he has met and conquered during his life. Deer Park High School Assistant Principal Mary Reynolds credits James'

success to, "his positive outlook, focus on the tasks before him, and the constant support system of his family who has stood by him every step of the way." SHARING Sultures and Delicacies

John Quincy Adams Elementary School second grade students hosted an International Luncheon to celebrate the holiday season. The American flag anchored a hanging classroom display of student-created international flags, each representing a piece of the class' diverse heritage.

Students were engaged in a multidimensional cultural curriculum in class, reading literature, examining geography, and designing artwork pertaining to their country of descent. The luncheon brought together these lessons by acquainting the students with the various traditions that exist among the families of their classmates.

Each parent and student prepared a special holiday dish; either one handed down from generation to generation, or simply a holiday favorite. To kick off the International Luncheon, each student prepared a presentation and spoke about their dish, explaining why it is a tradition in their family and illustrating the information they learned about their country of origin.

Second grade teachers Kathy Fontaine and Anne Isip created the program to help students identify with and celebrate the many different cultures that exist among them and other members of the Deer Park community.

Exploring Traditions through Music, Art & Technology

Fourth graders at John F. Kennedy Intermediate School learned about the cultures of Peru and Trinidad through a musical education program that brought together the history, literature, and arts of these diverse countries.

Long Island Traditions, an organization that honors cultural traditions through historic preservation, research, and education in the arts, spearheaded this cultural campaign in accordance with Deer Park's Fine and Performing Arts Department and a grant provided by the Rockefeller Foundation's New York State Music Fund. Deer Park is the first and only school district in Suffolk Country to utilize Long Island Traditions to create this type of program for its students.

A multidisciplinary program, students learned how to compose and perform music unique to the area, and learned about the history, economic systems, and geography, as well as Peruvian folksongs. They also played steel drums from Trinidad. Classroom workshops welcomed performers, artists, and Long Island Traditions educators. During these interactive sessions students composed traditional music from both countries, created art projects, and enhanced their literary skills by reading and writing about each country's past.

Incorporating tradition and technology, students also archived the information they learned, highlighted a journalistic component, and through podcasts shared their experiences with others outside the classroom.

In addition to the fourth grade program, two assemblies were held for the entire school, one wherein students enjoyed live Peruvian cultural performances. Displaying a customary poncho, singer Theo Torres introduced the traditional dance techniques and lyrics of Peruvian songs and inspired students to sing and clap along during the first concert. A Steel Sensations concert was held later in the fall to introduce students to Caribbean Music.

Unearthing the Past, Preserving the Present

Deer Park May Moore
Elementary School fused the past
and the present during a time
capsule dedication. A time capsule
securely placed behind the walls of
the school was retrieved last year as
part of the school's 50th anniversary
celebration. Present May Moore
students examined the contents of
the capsule, which was created by
May Moore students in 1956, the
school's inaugural year.

Students reviewed photos taken from the capsule and read student letters and articles written in 1956. Continuing the tradition, current May Moore students created documents and photo collages of their own, reflecting the present culture and

time period they are living in.

The program continued its cycle when the 1956 time capsule was placed back into its original position behind the bricks of May Moore and a new niche beside the original was carved for a new time capsule. Kindergarten, first and second grade classes cheered their classmates along as they sealed up the past and present.

May Moore's custodian, affectionately known to the students and community as "Mr. Joe," donated the commemorative marble which reads "2006" and is displayed at the entrance of school. This acknowledges the 50-year mark when students began assembling the new capsule. Parent Joe M.



performed the masonry work with the help of the District's Buildings and Grounds Department. His daughters Isabella and Sophia are pictured here alongside the building's original cornerstone.

Accepting the Challenge

Students at Deer Park High School experienced Rachel's Challenge, a dynamic program that motivates positive changes in the way students treat one another. Inspired by Rachel Scott, the first person killed during the tragic shootings at



Columbine High School eight years ago, this national effort emphasizes the kind acts she performed during her life and the contents of her diaries.

Students were engaged with powerful video and audio footage of Rachel's life and the Columbine tragedy. An interactive training session for students and teachers followed and was led by Jim May, a long time personal friend of the Scott family and part of the Rachel's Challenge team. Students were encouraged to reflect on the previous presentation and apply these lessons to their school and specific situations in their lives. At the culmination of the session, students 'accept' Rachel's Challenge by signing a banner (pictured) pledging to be open, honest, and respectful to their fellow classmates, demonstrating understanding and tolerance for each other's differences.

According to family members, positive open communication and a fostering of trust between classmates are character traits that epitomized Rachel Scott and how she lived and treated others.

COACH LUKSIK'S LEGACY LIVES ON

Wrestling Room Dedicated in Late Deer Park Wrestling Coach's Honor

Deer Park's Alumni Wrestling Foundation, athletic department, administration, and community members came together for a night of athletic competition in honor of former Deer Park High School teacher and wrestling coach Ed Luksik.

After a long battle with cancer, Coach Luksik died on November 24th, but his presence will live on as the high school's wrestling room was dedicated in his honor. The Deer Park school and wrestling community were on hand for the dedication, as Mr. Luksik's family was presented with a commemorative plaque.

During Coach Luksik's 30-year tenure, Deer Park High School's wrestling squad won five league titles and the 1995 Suffolk County Class B Championship. In 1975, Coach Luksik was named Suffolk County Coach of the Year and won the County's Grand Master Wrestling Coach's Award in 1996. In 1998 Coach Luksik obtained the ultimate achievement, when he was inducted into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame for lifetime service.


