
Participating students wear a Band-aid across their mouth for the entire day, and must use pen and paper, gestures and even body language to communicate with their teachers and peers while taking part in all required activities of the school day. At BandAid's conclusion, the students gather



to play a game or complete an activity reflecting on the difficulties they had without the ability to communicate like others.

"Doing the BandAid Project for three straight years was a really good experience, and I looked forward to it every year," said eighth-grader David Perez. "Once you put the Band-aid on, everything changes for you. It gave me a new point of view on what people with disabilities have to deal with in daily life."
